



# My Visit to Fourth Grades at UT Elementary School

I had the great opportunity to visit the fourth-grade classes at Upper Township Elementary School on Friday, November 22<sup>nd</sup> (2019) to talk about local Upper Twp. history and give a demonstration of the



## Local Upper Township history presented to Fourth Graders at UTES

NV-5 Archaeological dig site that was done on the corner of Routes 49 and 50 at the site of the old Willets/Williams house (Mr. Willets was the bridge tender for the Tuckahoe Bridge.)

I first presented in the cafeteria, much of the material from the dig site and two classes at a time came in to see and hear the presentation.

The 4th-grade teachers at UTES are Mrs. Kryzk, Mrs. Drewnowski, Mrs. Shallcross, Mrs. Moon/Frie, Mrs. Calderon, Mrs. Cozzza and Mrs. Arsenalt.

The students were wonderful and asked lots of questions. They got to see (and hold in their hands) an 8000-year-old Indian arrowhead (point) and other stone objects from a much later time which came from the Tuckahoe River dig site off Mosquito Landing. (This was the second dig site in addition to the Willets/Williams site)

I brought in my (Reproduction – non firing) colonial Brown Bess musket which is the exact size and weight of a real one.

(Although the Brown Bess was the favored musket of the British Army, it nonetheless looked like most other muskets of the day.) The kids were fascinated by the workings of the gun and how it was loaded and fired. I was able to show them real pieces of flint that had been found at the dig site so they could understand how the flints were a key part of the lock and firing system of the musket. (Earlier guns were matchlocks and later guns, in the Civil War era, were percussion cap systems which replaced the frizzen, hammer/flint, and powder pan.)

I was motivated to bring the musket because in the Willets/Williams house privy were found a rusted hammer mechanism and a large screw which tightened the flint into the hammer. I was able to show the students exactly how the gun was loaded and fired, without actually firing it.

Discussions with the students about

## HPSUT's Museum Committee Report for December 2019

Well by now, everyone knows that the County Open Space Board turned us down. Their reasons are clear, but it doesn't make it any easier to deal with after working on this plan for so long. (4+ years) I will not go into the details of the response to our application, but I want to make it clear that I believe we were led down the garden path in believing that a Parks and Recreation Application would yield a satisfactory end with the most money available for the project. (Indeed, the amount was to be 100%.) I also took issue with their statement which said in essence that attending a museum is not considered recreation! I strenuously disagree!

We were convinced we were on the right

outhouses and privies were quite amusing. Some students knew about outhouses (They did not know the word privy, so that was explained). For fourth graders, talk of bodily functions, toilet paper, (non-existent in those days) prompted hilarious questions of course.

Privy humor for kids has probably been around since, well, since there were privies! We also discussed the fact that most families had glazed pottery *chamber pots* and how they were used (especially on cold winter nights when one had to go!) We talked about what they do now with broken objects and food debris in their homes (They're thrown into the trash can. And then what happens to it?) and then I explained what people did with their trash back in early America.

Everything broken or no longer usable went into the privy. All table scraps, animal bones after meals etc. also were scraped into the privy. These things never went into wells/cisterns since that might pollute their water. (This was also explained to the students when one student suggested that things of this nature were thrown into the well!)

I explained to the students why I thought there were two bone handled dinner forks found at the dig site. (I first asked them to think about why they were there since they were not broken.) Could a child

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track. I take the responsibility for not periodically checking to be sure that the path was a straight one. We were not intentionally deceived, but things could have been made clearer by the Director of The Open Space Board.

I had been in touch several times during the process with one of their members, and I felt we were on track.

Everyone needs to understand however, that had we applied for an Open Space Historical Grant, the funding amount would have been just \$150K; and this with matching funds! The HPSUT would have to come up with \$75K. Far too difficult.

We will need to come up with alternative ideas if this is to come to fruition.

At that point I requested a meeting with the mayor, Hobie, and Paul.

At this meeting several weeks ago, the mayor told Linda Leonard and me first of all that the township committee could not unite to get behind the expenditure of \$1.9 million for this old building.

Mayor Palombo believes that the best approach at this time would be for the township to give us a piece of land, suitable in size to build an entirely new museum (as did Harriett Bailey) for a far lower amount than the \$1.9 million requested in the Open Space Grant. He said that the rest of the committee could support that but not the renovation of the building at that cost.

The money spent for the asbestos abatement had to be done no matter what the township decided to do with the building; be it sold or torn down.

It was also discussed at the meeting with the mayor, that maybe we could use the plans developed by Chris Menchin, (the architect on the old school project) in developing plans for the new building.

At this time, Paul Dietrich has been requested by the township committee to look for this land in the township and he has been doing just that with Committee-man, Hobie Young.

The money to pay for a museum is the elephant in the room. How do we go about paying for this?

I am most interested in having the township place the building of this on the ballot as a bond issue. I think the people of the township would vote for it; especially since back in 2017, when we asked read-

ers of the Gazette if they supported a museum, the informal survey was 85% in favor. Also, when one does the math, the rate on a plan of less than a million dollars is negligible.

Fundraising is a difficult and trying process but it can be done- IF the membership feels that this is a worthwhile goal. We cannot do this without YOU, our support base. If you do not think this is worthwhile, we ought to know this now. If you do indeed support a museum for our township, then we need to know that as well. PLEASE contact me with your views on the matter. Deborah Patterson has volunteered to be our Fundraising Lead, and we will be planning campaigns at our next Museum Committee Meeting sometime in December or the new year.

Fundraising for the museum is essential because we will need so much inside the building in addition to the building itself! We cannot do this with Strawberry and Apple Fest profits or profits from our new book. It must be on a large donor level; corporate sponsorships and partnerships with businesses both local and national. (In our original plans we had a Donor Wall set up for Friends of the Museum to buy a wall tile or block.)

have scraped the plates and lost them? Humorously, I asked the students if they could be retrieved once dropped in? The students were asked if they ever had done this when scraping dishes into the garbage. Many affirmatives! I asked how many kids' families composted, and only a fraction did so. I explained why this is so important.

People in colonial America had no trash cans, garbage bags, etc. and I explained that in this respect, life was better. Most other aspects of daily life were much more difficult; like finding food and cooking food every day.

I had only about 45 minutes to an hour with each group (of two classes each) and so maximized my time with them. There were lots of questions and I answered them all.

I left NV-5/NJDOT dig site brochures for each student before I left, so they could share the information with their parents. Even after having taught fourth graders for over 31 years in my career as an educator, I came home exhausted. (And that wasn't even a full day. I reflected on how lucky I am at my age to be retired!)

Kudos to the Upper Township Elementary School fourth grade teachers who work with our students every day and who were willing to invite me into their school and help their students learn about colonial Upper Township history!

I hope to return in mid-late February to show them photographs from the book, *Upper Township and Its Ten Villages* to be published the week of February 3<sup>rd</sup>.

There are also many people behind the scenes who have given their time and energy to help us: Sonia Forey, Doug Longenecker and Ian and Sandra Hamilton.


