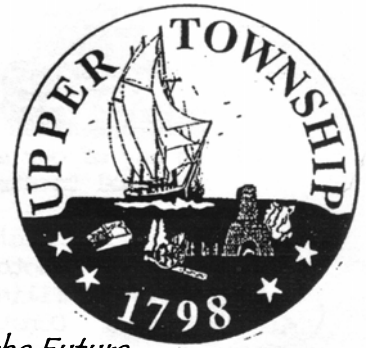

The following is for your information! This letter was sent to the Township Committee this summer.

To: Upper Township Committee

From: The Historical Preservation Society of Upper Twp.

Ref: Seven Year History of Pest Control of Friendship School

Old house wood borers and powder post beetles were found in the Friendship School as early as 2002. A meeting was held at the school with the Society's board of directors and Barbara Camp, Twp. Committeewoman. Barbara Camp was in charge of buildings and grounds owned by Upper Township.

Several letters of correspondence to different Pest Control companies have been included with this report to verify the attention given to the Friendship School in the past seven years.

Prior to the action taken on July 14, 2009 by the Western Pest Service the Historical Preservation Society has invested over two thousand dollars in unsuccessful treatment of old house wood borers and powder post beetles at the Friendship school in Palermo.

After contacting the Western Pest Service we learned they are the only company certified to use the tent fumigation method in the state of New Jersey. We learned this method of treatment was the only way our problem of old house wood borers and powder post beetles could be destroyed. This treatment must be done during the summer months for control purposes. The cost was far in excess of our budget for maintenance. We would appreciate the Township Committee helping with the cost of \$6,466.00.

Receipt from Western Pest Service for our expenditure is enclosed and copies of checks written by the Historical preservation Society are available upon request.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The Upper Cape Library Branch is scheduled for major renovations during the coming 2010 season, possibly winter or early spring.* The Library will be closed but temporarily relocated at a site to be announced. This means that our Society's file cabinet will need to be moved and therefore emptied of its contents. Rachel Dolhanczyk will assist with inventory, also disposal of certain outdated technical manuals: the decision as to storage location of the photos, books artifacts, documents, etc. will be determined after the initial survey is completed.

During the fumigation of the Friendship School, a few objects that were suspected of possible infestation were placed inside the school. In particular, a rope bed previously in long-term storage at the Farmstead granary, is now in the hands of Mr. Fred Peech of Palermo, antiques dealer and furniture restorer. The bed is planned for display on the second floor of the Gandy House.

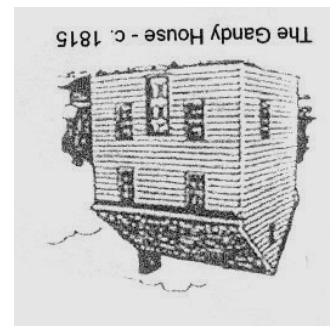
President's Memo
